Drucker, having passed away in 2005, of course knew nothing of the novel coronavirus, but for us, living in these turbulent times, we have to admit that his predictions have come true.

Drucker predicted that, in the coming knowledge society, knowledge will have value and knowledge workers will be the foundation of society. Additionally, he stated that the ongoing IT revolution and globalization are the foundation of the knowledge society.
